Programme of study: what course and specialization did you take?

I chose to take the Master's degree in Transportation Sciences, with an option in Mobility management.

Objectives and expectations: did the course meet your objectives or expectations? If Yes, Why and How? If No, what was different?

I can actually say it did for the most part. The programme was structured in such a way that it was varied and multidisciplinary.

Suggestions: do you have any improvements or suggestions on the course content or presentation?

I would suggest a wider variety of guest lecturers for the Road Safety in the South course. If I recall, there were quite a few visiting lecturers from Vietnam which was interesting but I think a more varied perspective would have been beneficial to students.

The classes where software packages such as SASR and SPSS were taught could have been presented in a more approachable way. The courses seemed to assume a base-level of knowledge amongst students, however this was not always present, as fellow students came from different backgrounds (academically and with regard to knowledge). Some students failed those courses because lectures started from the middle instead of focusing on explaining basic concepts more thoroughly.

Inspiring lecturers: which lecturer inspired you the most?

I felt that dr. Veerle Ross and Prof. dr. Kris Brijs always presented well-planned and well-structured courses.

Memories: what are some of your experiences in Hasselt University, i.e what are your best and worst memories of Hasselt University?

My worst memory was failing my statistics course and my best memories were events such as the student take-off and meeting new friends.

Life after UHasselt: after graduation, did you get a job in line with your specialization?

Yes, I got a job in Sustainable Transport Consulting.
